Session Twelve Overview (Purpose, Payoff, and Process)



Purpose: The purpose of our twelfth and final session is to gain an overview of SDG 16 & 17 that relates to reducing inequality within and between countries. We will explore the future (solution) and call in the wisdom of twenty years from now. We will celebrate the grand finale of the Hero's Journey and

explore the value of honoring how far we've come.

Payoff: The payoff is that we have become true visionaries (and *action-aries*) of the future. We are experiencing the heart expanding, soul-fulfilling joy that comes with knowing we've done something worth celebrating. When we celebrate a victory or a conclusion to a long-term project it strengthens confidence and inspires us to do more toward having an even greater impact on the planet.

SDG 16 & 17 Targets:

SDG 16. Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development; provide access to justice for all and build effective; accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels.

SDG 17. Strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development.

SDG 16. Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development; provide access to justice for all and build effective; accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels.



- 16.1 Significantly reduce all forms of violence and related death rates everywhere.
- 16.2 End abuse, exploitation, trafficking and all forms of violence and torture against children.
- 16.3 Promote the rule of law at the national and international levels, and ensure equal access to justice for all.
- 16.4 By 2030 significantly reduce illicit financial and arms flow, strengthen recovery and return of stolen assets, and combat all forms of organized crime.
- 16.5 Substantially reduce corruption and bribery in all its forms.
- 16.6 Develop effective, accountable and transparent institutions at all levels.
- 16.7 Ensure responsive, inclusive, participatory and representative decision-making at all levels.
- 16.8 Broaden and strengthen the participation of developing countries in the institutions of global governance.
- 16.9 By 2030 provide legal identity for all including birth registration.
- 16.10 Ensure public access to information and protect fundamental freedoms, in accordance with national legislation and international agreements

16.a Strengthen relevant national institutions, including through international cooperation, for building capacities at all levels, in particular in developing countries, for preventing violence and combating terrorism and crime.

16.b Promote and enforce non-discriminatory laws and policies for sustainable development.

SDG 17. Strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development.



17.1 Strengthen domestic resource mobilization, including through international support to developing countries to improve domestic capacity for tax and other revenue collection.

17.2 Developed countries to implement fully their ODA (Official development assistance) commitments, including to provide 0.7% of GNI (Gross National Income) in ODA to developing countries of which 0.15-0.20% to least-developed countries.

17.3 Mobilize additional financial resources for developing countries from multiple sources.

17.4 Assist developing countries in attaining long-term debt sustainability through coordinated policies aimed at fostering debt financing, debt relief and debt restructuring, as appropriate, and address the external debt of highly indebted poor countries (HIPC) to reduce debt distress.

17.5 Adopt and implement investment promotion regimes for LDCs.

17.6 Enhance North-South, South-South and triangular regional and international cooperation on and access to science, technology and innovation, and enhance knowledge sharing on mutually agreed terms, including through improved coordination among existing mechanisms, particularly at UN level, and through a global technology facilitation mechanism when agreed.

17.7 Promote development, transfer, dissemination and diffusion of environmentally sound technologies to developing countries on favorable terms, including on concessional and preferential terms, as mutually agreed.

17.8 Fully operationalize the Technology Bank and STI (Science, Technology and Innovation) capacity building mechanism for LDCs (least developed countries) by 2017, and enhance the use of enabling technologies in particular ICT.

Capacity building

17.9 Enhance international support for implementing effective and targeted capacity building in developing countries to support national plans to implement all sustainable development goals, including through North-South, South-South, and triangular cooperation.

Trade

- 17.10 Promote a universal, rules-based, open, non-discriminatory and equitable multilateral trading system under the WTO (world trade organization) including through the conclusion of negotiations within its Doha Development Agenda.
- 17.11 Increase significantly the exports of developing countries, in particular with a view to doubling the LDC share of global exports by 2020.
- 17.12 Realize timely implementation of duty-free, quota-free market access on a lasting basis for all least developed countries consistent with WTO decisions, including through ensuring that preferential rules of origin applicable to imports from LDCs are transparent and simple, and contribute to facilitating market access.
- 17.13 Enhance global macroeconomic stability including through policy coordination and policy coherence.

- 17.14 Enhance policy coherence for sustainable development.
- 17.15 Respect each country's policy space and leadership to establish and implement policies for poverty eradication and sustainable development.
- 17.16 Enhance the global partnership for sustainable development complemented by multi-stakeholder partnerships that mobilize and share knowledge, expertise, technologies and financial resources to support the achievement of sustainable development goals in all countries, particularly developing countries.
- 17.17 Encourage and promote effective public, public-private, and civil society partnerships, building on the experience and resourcing strategies of partnerships.
- 17.18 By 2020, enhance capacity building support to developing countries, including for LDCs and SIDS (small island developing states), to increase significantly the availability of high-quality, timely and reliable data disaggregated by income, gender, age, race, ethnicity, migratory status, disability, geographic location and other characteristics relevant in national contexts.
- 17.19 By 2030, build on existing initiatives to develop measurements of progress on sustainable development that complement GDP (gross domestic product), and support statistical capacity building in developing countries.

SDG Hero: Angelina Jolie Goodwill Ambassador



Angelina Jolie's interest in humanitarian affairs was piqued in 2000 when she went to Cambodia to film the adventure movie, "Tomb Raider." She soon began travelling with UNHCR to the field and, ever since, her interest and determination to help the displaced, publicize their plight and lobby for international assistance has never flagged. Named a UNHCR Goodwill Ambassador in 2001, Jolie has carried out more than 40 field missions to some of the most remote regions of the world to highlight the plight of millions of uprooted people and to advocate for their protection.

In 2012, High Commissioner Anto □nio Guterres recognized her years of extraordinary service with the refugee agency by appointing her as his Special Envoy. In her new and expanded role, she focuses on large-scale crises resulting in mass population displacement. She visited Ecuador in April 2012 for her first mission as Special Envoy.

In addition to her field missions for UNHCR, Jolie has made it her mission to give a voice to refugees and internally displaced people. She undertakes advocacy on their behalf, representing UNHCR and the High Commissioner at the diplomatic level and engaging with others on global displacement issues. Her work helps to facilitate lasting solutions for people displaced by conflict and has inspired others to take a more active role.

The Special Envoy's commitment to the organization is further demonstrated through her donations to UNHCR, amounting to more than US\$5 million since 2001. The funds have gone towards building schools - in locations such as Kenya and Afghanistan - as well as other initiatives aimed at improving the lives of the forcibly displaced.



In addition to her work for UNHCR, Jolie continues to travel to bear witness to and support disaster relief, vulnerable children, environmental conservation, and international law and justice efforts worldwide. In 2003, she started the Maddox Jolie-Pitt Foundation project dedicated to conservation in Cambodia, which later expanded to agriculture, education, health care, vocational

training, infrastructure, rural planning and microcredit programs.

In 2005, she launched the National Centre for Refugee and Immigrant Children, an organization that provides free legal aid to young asylum-seekers. In 2008, she partnered with Microsoft to launch Kids in Need of Defense (KIND), a pro bono movement of law firms, corporate law departments, NGOs and volunteers committed to providing legal advice to unaccompanied immigrant children in the United States. She also co-chairs the Education Partnership for Children of Conflict, which helps fund education programs for children affected by conflict.

In 2007, Jolie became a member of the influential Council on Foreign Relations (CFR). Jolie has since funded various CFR special reports, including the "Intervention to Stop Mass Atrocities and Genocide." Following several visits to Haiti in 2010, she established the Jolie Legal Fellows Program to enhance government capacity around the rule of law. The program places young lawyers within the existing structures in Haiti to support the government's child protection efforts.

The Jolie-Pitt Foundation, meanwhile, has provided funding in Namibia to the N/a'an ku se ☐ Wildlife Sanctuary for the care of injured wildlife and to help minimize conflict between humans and wild animals. Jolie has funded children's centers in Cambodia and Ethiopia, which apply innovative and integrated treatment for children infected with or affected by HIV/AIDS and tuberculosis.

Jolie's devotion to humanitarian causes has not gone unnoticed. In 2003, she was the first recipient of the Citizen of the World Award by the United Nations Correspondents Association, and in 2005 she was awarded the Global Humanitarian Award by the United Nations Association of the USA and the Business Council for the United Nations for her work with refugees. In 2007, the International Rescue Committee awarded its Freedom Award to Jolie and High Commissioner Guterres for their contributions to the cause of refugees and human freedom. In October 2011, the UN refugee agency paid tribute to Jolie, for her 10 years of service to the humanitarian cause as a UNHCR Goodwill Ambassador.

SDG Hero: Essrea Cherin

Conflict Resolution Specialist



Essrea Cherin has the unique distinction of being one of only a handful of women to have circumnavigated the globe largely on foot as a 'global peace- walker'. Since that early, mind and heart-expanding adventure, Essrea has focused her efforts to help obtain peace on the art of conflict resolution.

From September, 2004 to December, 2011 she was the coordinator of the Board of Directors for Abraham's Path, a hiking trail and pilgrimage route that retraces Abraham's footsteps in the Middle East and was the business manager for Dr. William Ury, a globally sought negotiation expert and peacemaker helping people around the world 'Get to Yes!'

As Co-founder and Board Chair of the Boulder-Nablus Sister City Project, Essrea has been instrumental in creating a cross-cultural initiative to link members of the two diverse communities of Boulder, CO, USA and Nablus, Palestine, and in January, 2012 she founded Missing Peace, a successful workshop model designed to address unresolved wounds from experienced or generational trauma that, untreated, contribute to the painful reality in Palestine and Israel, and, treated, cultivate the foundation for justice to reign.

Essrea teaches conflict management techniques to diverse audiences and clients and has been teaching Conflict Management, Communication Ethics, Negotiation, Intercultural Communication, and Interpersonal Communication for the past 10 years as an adjunct faculty member at Regis University. http://www.embracingconflict.com/

Hero's Journey Stage 12: Home with the Elixir & How it relates to the Youth Ambassador Program:



Dreaming tribes like the Iroquois of North America, Aborigines of Australia, and the Senoi of Malaysia, believe your dream is a gift not only for you...but for your entire tribe. In this way, these cultures truly live the philosophy: *As one is lifted, all are lifted.*

When you share what you've earned and learned from your hero's journey with your community, your family, the world, or anyone with ears to hear, you are sharing a soul- filled gift that can change lives.

The lessons (and blessin's) you've learned along the way have been on a soulular level...and when you share soul to soul with people who want/need/are scheduled to hear your wisdom, it can have a medicinal effect...it is truly an elixir of spirit. In fact, your very presence IS THE ELIXIR.

As much as you've done, changed, transformed, your journey is incomplete until you've come full-circle back to the place from whence you came, to share and bear witness to your journey. Maya Angelou said, "You can never go home again, but the truth is you can never leave home, so it's all right."

Contemplate the following questions:

- ➤ How has this journey benefited you? How has it changed you?
- How will you bring the message of what you've learned (or the tangible benefits of your project) home and share your elixir with your community?
- ➤ How will your work have a lasting impact even after you're gone?
- > The top of one mountain is the beginning of the next-what will be your next "mountain"?

Success breeds success.


Before rushing headlong into your next hero's journey, **celebrate your successes** (your personal successes and those of your team) and honor all that you've accomplished.
